A Short History of the Madison County Coin Club

Why was the club started?

I was transferred for work to Huntsville, AL and moved with my family from Virginia (living near Washington D.C.) to Madison, AL in April 2000. I had been coming to Huntsville since 1998 for business trips on a regular basis and had looked for a coin club in the area. I did attend some one-day coin shows held in Huntsville. At the local coin shows in Huntsville I asked about a coin club in the area, and a number of people told me there were none, and probably no interest.

In Virginia I was an American Numismatic Association (ANA) District Delegate volunteer. I have been an active ANA volunteer in a number of positions since 1993. There was not an ANA member club in the area at the time, or even an active coin club. I contacted the ANA Headquarters in Colorado Springs and requested a search of ANA members within a 50-mile radius of Huntsville, sometime in late 2000. I was informed by the ANA that there were a little over 100 ANA members in my search area.

I decided that with so many ANA members, there should be interest for a coin club, and I decided to start one. The club would have four main focuses:

1. Education
 - a. *MCCC Newsletter*
 - b. Speakers
 - c. Displays, exhibits
2. Fellowship
 - a. Refreshments at meeting
 - b. Pot-luck dinners
 - c. Gathering before and after the meeting
3. Public Service
 - a. Outreach to schools, scouts, community groups
 - b. Assist Senior Center members with their numismatic questions
 - c. Respond to public inquires
4. Collecting Opportunities
 - a. Club auction
 - b. Buying and selling at meeting
 - c. Non-members bring in items to sell

Why the Huntsville-Madison County Senior Center selected as the meeting location?

When I started to look for a club meeting location, I wanted the following:

1. Low cost
2. Evening hours
3. Parking
4. Security
5. Committed meeting day and time

I inquired at local restaurants and public libraries. None of them could meet the above requirements. Many places wanted a monthly fee or guaranteed sales, or would not commit to a monthly meeting day and time.

Some people recommended churches to me, but these also had drawbacks as to the above requirements. In late 2000, I was given the name of the Executive Director of the Huntsville-Madison County Senior Center. I called and made an appointment to meet with him. We had our meeting in late 2000, and I found he was looking for new clubs to support the Senior Center mission. He offered me a meeting room on the fourth Monday of every month (if not closed for a holiday) in the evening for no cost. I accepted. The only requirement was that the meeting be open to all and have a sign-in log (now replaced with a computer key card sign-in).

The club has made a regular yearly donation to the Huntsville-Madison County Senior Center in appreciation of the support received each year. The club left in 2021 due to changes in meeting requirements after in-person meetings restarted.

Why Membership in Other Numismatic Organizations? –

The club is a member of the following numismatic organizations:

1. American Numismatic Association (ANA)- Club member No. C-195870
The club was an ANA member in 2001, before the first meeting.
2. Alabama Numismatic Society (ANS)- Club member No. C-3084
The club joined ANS in 2001.
3. Florida United Numismatists, Inc. (FUN)- Club member No. 25233
The club joined FUN in 2013.
4. Georgia Numismatic Association (GNA)- Club member No. CR015

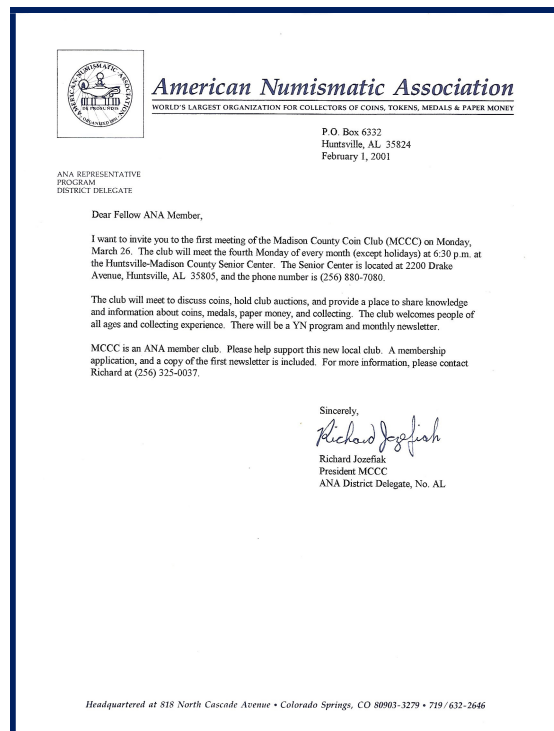
The club joined GNA on June 17, 2003.

I felt that the club being a member of the above organizations provided MCCC with visibility by other people and to be listed in the organizations' publication. This would help with recruiting new members.

The ANA provides a number of services to member clubs, and MCCC has used a number of these services every year. Many club members also attend the Alabama State show, GNA show and FUN show every year. Having the club as part of the greater numismatic community I feel, is a benefit to both the club and hobby and worth the cost.

ANA Letter Mailed to all ANA Members and Local Advertising-

I coordinated with staff at the ANA in Colorado Springs to do a mailing of about 100 letters to invite ANA members in the greater Huntsville area to the first club meeting. The letter was prepared around December 2000, with a February 1 planned mailing date. The first meeting was scheduled for Monday, March 26, 2001.

Local meeting notices for the club were published in *The Huntsville Times*, on WLRH public radio, and some other local publications. Notices were placed in the Huntsville Senior Center.

Surprised Phone Call in February 2001-

About February 2001, the American Numismatic Association (ANA) mailed a welcome letter about a new coin club forming in north Alabama to all ANA members within about a 50-mile radius of Huntsville, AL. Shortly after the letter was mailed, my wife received a phone call from a secretary about arranging a lunch meeting with her boss and myself to talk about the new coin club. I was surprised since I did not recognize the name given, nor the company. I returned the call, and scheduled the meeting. The location was the old Landry's restaurant in Huntsville (the restaurant closed and was torn down in 2020, and a hotel is being built on the site). The name I was given was Mr. Anderson, and was told he is a coin collector.

I met Mr. Charles Anderson for the first time at our meeting at Landry's. I found that he was very involved with numismatics and was a long time ANA member. He also was a coin collector with many interests.

He asked me my plans for the new club, and I showed him my plans and goals. I went over my first year expected expenses. He asked me about my background and my involvement with the ANA and coin collecting. He said he wanted to help with the club, and he wrote me a check for a membership which also included a generous donation to the new club. He became a charter member, and has been a club member ever since.

After he treated me to a nice lunch, we went to his car, and he gave me two large boxes. These had Whitman Publishing albums, folders, books, and other items. For about the first two years of the club meetings, these items were used as the door prizes. The prizes were well received by the club members, and helped save the club from buying door prizes at the beginning.

I would see Mr. Charles Anderson at major ANA coin shows over the years, and give him a quick update on how the club was doing. He also read articles about MCCC in ANA publications and the numismatic press over the years and said he enjoyed knowing that the club was doing well.

Mr. Charles Anderson has been an MCCC member since 2001, and gives a yearly donation to the club, in addition to his yearly membership. He has never attended a club meeting, but he continues to support the club.

The club has been able to do a number of projects over the years with the donations he has made and this has greatly helped the club with growth and membership. I want to personally thank Mr. Charles Anderson for his continuing support of MCCC.

The *MCCC Newsletter* started publication on March 2001, when the first club meeting was held. It has been published almost every month there was a meeting. With twenty years of publishing, and about ten issues each year, there is estimated over 1,500 pages that have been published! A typical newsletter issue contains: club news, coin show calendar, club program calendar, articles on numismatic topics, and photos. It is designed to educate, inform, and entertain the reader. *MCCC Newsletter* is truly a local publication for the Huntsville/Madison County numismatic community.

As the first editor of the *MCCC Newsletter*, I felt that a club needed such a publication for the club to be successful. The *MCCC Newsletter* was a hard copy publication from 2001 to about 2005, when the next editor, Harold Fears, converted the *MCCC Newsletter* to an electronic publication. An electronic publication had many advantages: no copy costs, no postage costs, time savings in preparing the newsletter and mailing. The cost savings allowed the club to keep its dues low, and funds to be used for other purposes.

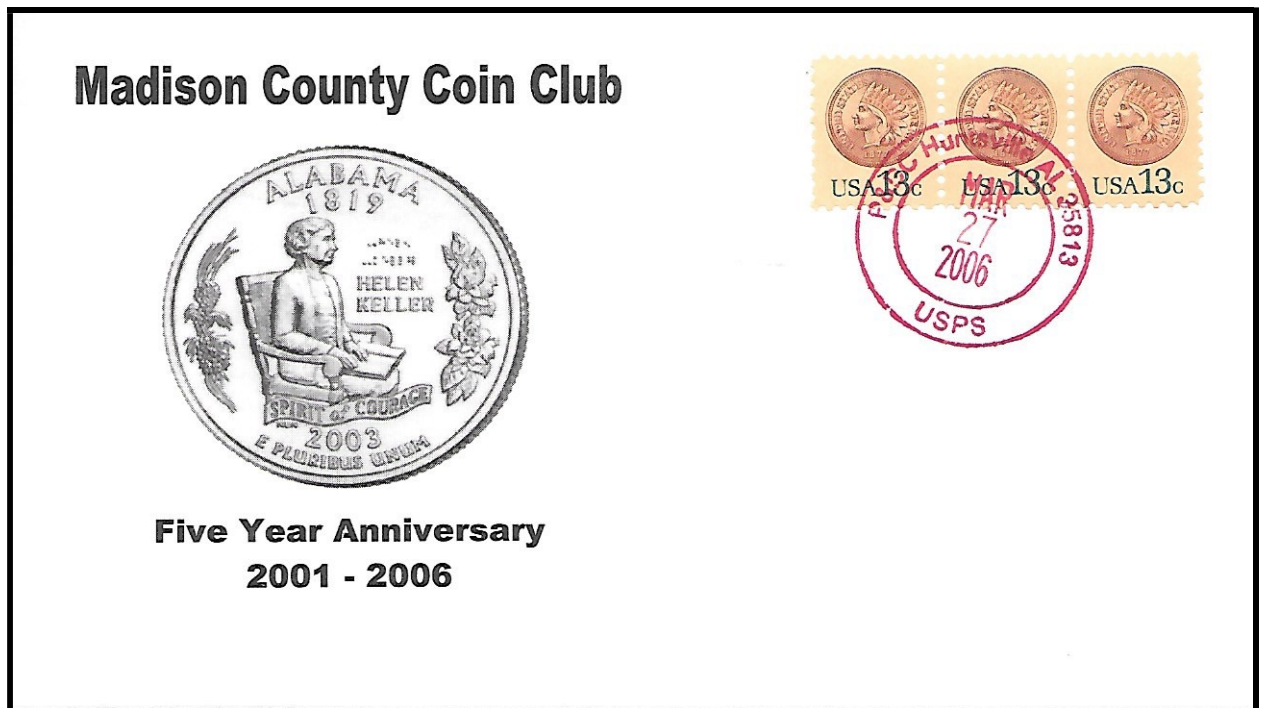

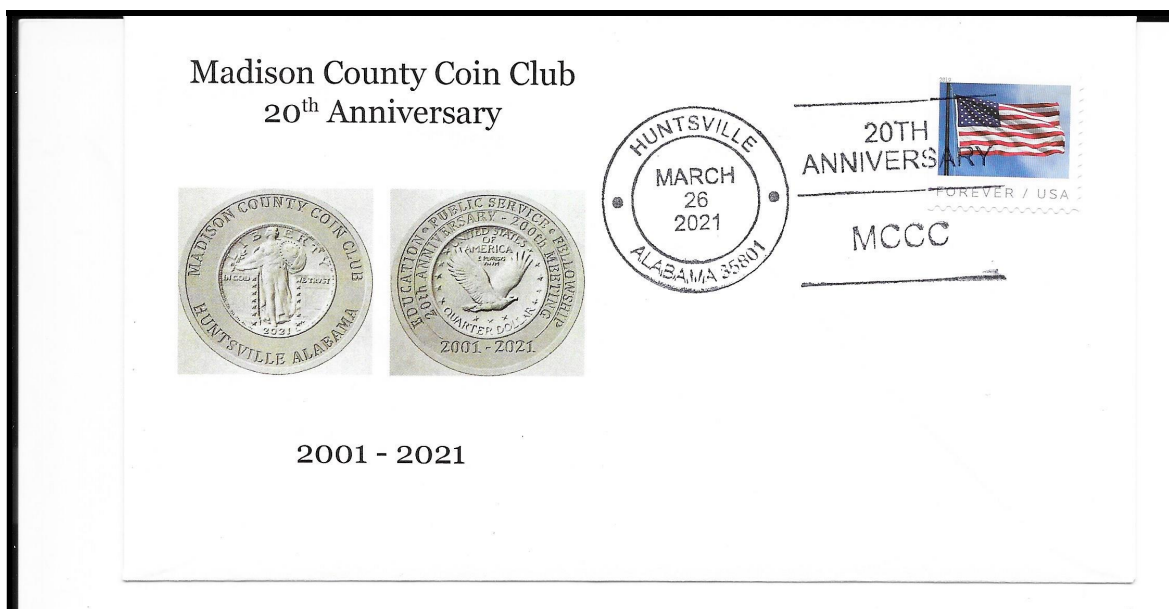

Madison County Coin Club held a regular virtual meeting on Tuesday, April 27, 2021 beginning at 6:30 pm CT. At the meeting was long time member Robert (Bob) Jaques along with fourteen other members. Unknown to everyone, Bob would pass only a few hours after this meeting. Bob died in the morning of Wednesday, April 28, 2021. He passed after doing something he loved to do. He was 80 years old (October 17, 1940-April 28, 2021).

Bob was very active in numismatics. Appendix B

Information on MCCC 20th Anniversary/200th Meeting Medals Production By the Moonlight Mint

Report from Mr. Dan Carr, Moonlight Mint from his e-mail on Friday, February 26, 2021 to MCCC committee members on the MCCC 20th Anniversary/200th Meeting medals status:

- The dies were engraved and then heat-treated (hardened) a couple days ago.
- Earlier today I struck the medals as well.
- First, I struck a few copper medals, then a couple silver, a couple brass, and then a couple nickel. I did that to make sure that all would strike ok. They did.
- Since brass and nickel are fairly hard, I decided to strike the silver first, then the copper, then the brass, and lastly the nickel.
- I don't use nickel very much anymore due to being as hard as it is. I also use brass less than I used to, for the same reason.
- All the silver and all the copper came out fine.
-
- The first 12 brass also came out fine. I didn't realize it at the time, but when I struck the 13th brass medal, a small sliver of hard metal (probably from the edge of the obverse die) was struck into the brass medal. When I look at it now under magnification I can see it. But not knowing that during the striking, I proceeded to strike the remaining 12 brass medals. The small sliver of metal caused a thin die gouge which can be seen running through the "T" of LIBERTY on the obverse. Under magnification the gouge looks like a thin die crack.
- Once I finished the 25 brass medals I started on the nickel. I still had not noticed the thin die gouge (it is not obvious by any means).
-
- After striking 16 of the nickel medals, I noticed on the 17th nickel medal that there was a new and somewhat obvious die crack on the obverse near the rim at 3:00. The 18th nickel medal came out the same as the 17th. But at that point a piece of the die fell out. The die crack had become an actual cud. The cud die break extends from the second "A" of ALABAMA to the "U" of CLUB. A small part of the "A" and about half of the "B" are obscured by the cud.
-
- My thoughts were that everyone in the club would probably like a medal with the cud on it. I couldn't go back and strike more without it, so I decided to continue striking so that, in addition to the initial 18 nickel medals without the cud, there would be 25 more

nickel medals with the cud. After striking 8 more nickel medals with the initial cud, some more small pieces broke off the die and the cud grew in size by about 50%. One of those small pieces of broken die steel became embedded (struck into) a nickel medal. I can tell because I can see it under magnification and a magnet is attracted to that area of the medal. The larger cud also covered almost all of the "MA" of ALABAMA.

-
- At this point I still had not been able to produce 25 identical nickel medals. So I continued on and struck 25 more nickel medals with the larger cud. The cud did not grow in size during those 25.
- This is the first time in over 10 years that I have had a die break such as this.

So here is what I have to ship to you on Friday 26 February via USPS Registered Mail (listed in striking order):

(25) Silver medals, all edge-marked "ONE TROY OZ . 999 SILVER", and all with edge-marked serial numbers "01" through "25".

(25) Copper medals.

(12) Brass medals (without thin die gouge).

(1) Brass medal with thin die sliver embedded.

(12) Brass medals (with thin die gouge).

(16) Nickel medals (with thin die gouge but no die crack).

(2) Nickel medals (with die crack).

(8) Nickel medals (with initial cud die break).

(1) Nickel medal (with larger cud die break and embedded die fragment).

(25) Nickel medals (with larger cud die break).

(1) Obverse die with cud die break.

(1) Reverse die.

(1) Largest piece that broke off the obverse die (it put it in a coin tube so that it won't get lost) .

I struck a couple of each for myself. They are in addition to those listed above. I did not make anything for myself that is not identical to other medals being shipped to you.

The two medals that have embedded die fragments will be indicated as such on the holders that I provide.

I will do the same for the edge serial numbers.

I will need the address where to ship these.

Here is the final invoice (I will not charge for the additional 27 nickel medals) (also note that physical silver is somewhat hard to come by right now and I had to pay about \$29 per ounce to get some).

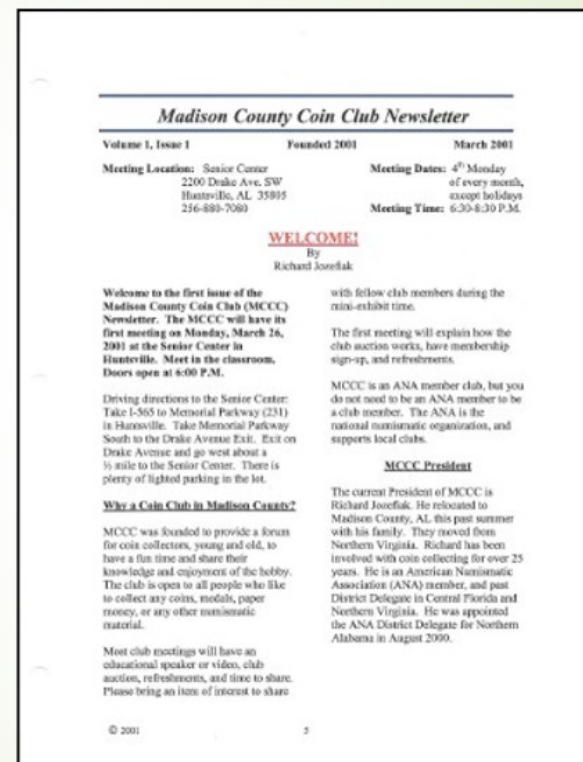

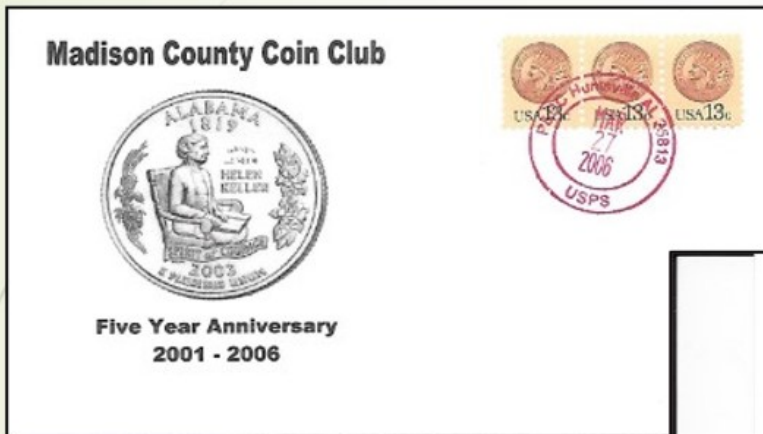

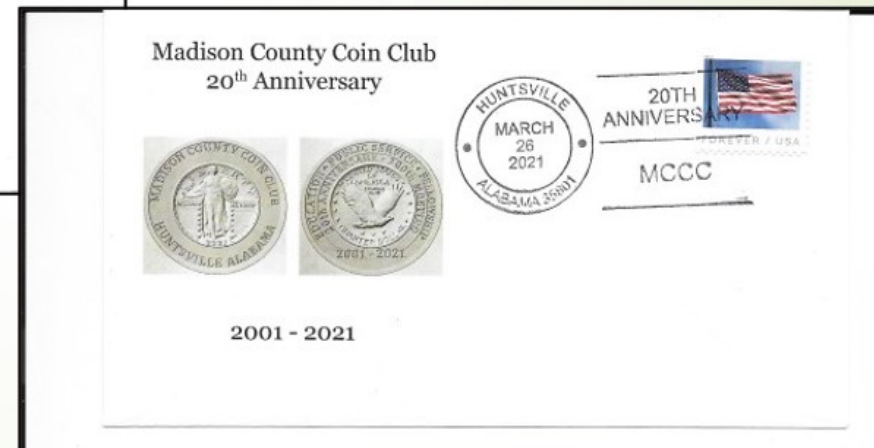

Appendix F

2001 Madison County Coin Club **Constitution & Bylaws**

Article 1- Title and Object

Section 1. This organization shall be known as the Madison County Coin Club (MCCC).

Section 2. The object of the Madison County Coin Club shall be to encourage and dispense numismatic knowledge and cultivate fraternity among its members. The club shall be open to people of all ages. Educational programs and social programs will be held.

Article 2- Membership

Section 1. Any person over eighteen years of age shall be considered for regular membership; individuals under eighteen years of age shall be eligible for Young Numismatist (YN) membership. There will be spouse membership, and family membership options.

Section 2. Individuals may be proposed for membership at any regular meetings, but membership shall not be confirmed until the next regular meeting.

Section 3. Applications for membership shall be voted upon by the members present at the regular meeting, or by the Board of Directors. An affirmative majority shall admit the applicant into membership.

Article 3- Officers

Section 1. Club officers shall include a president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, and three directors. All officers shall be on the Board of Directors, with the president as chairman of the board. All officers and directors shall be nominated, and elected at the last annual meeting of the year. They shall all serve for one-year terms, with terms beginning January 1 of a year. Elections shall begin for the 2002-year term.

Section 2. Any member in good standing shall be eligible for office.

Section 3. If any officer or director can not complete their term, then the board of directors shall appoint a replacement for the rest of the term.

Article 4- Amendments

Section 1. The constitution may be amended by a 2/3 majority vote involving all members.

Section 2. Amendments may not be voted upon during the same meeting at which they are proposed. There must be a 30 days notice before a vote.

Section 3. Members absent from meetings at which amendment voting is scheduled may vote by proxy.

Bylaws

Article 1- Officers

Section 1. The procedure of all meetings shall be conducted according to accepted parliamentary law.

Section 2. The president shall preside at all meetings and supervise all matters of interest to the club.

Section 3. The vice president shall act in the absence of the president. If the vice president is not present, then another officer or board member shall act in the absence of the president.

Section 4. The secretary shall record the minutes of the meeting, preserve all documents, handle general correspondence and maintain a current list of members.

Section 5. The treasurer shall collect and record all dues and fees, dispensing no funds (except listed below) without the consent of the board of directors. The treasurer can dispense funds for necessities such as postage, printing, refreshments, and raffle/door prizes and YN auction items. The treasurer shall present a statement of all receipts and expenditures at the annual meeting.

Article 2- Meetings

Section 1. Regular meetings shall be scheduled for the fourth Monday of each month, except on holidays, or when the meeting location is closed.

Section 2. The annual meeting shall mark the beginning of the new fiscal year, and shall be in January.

Section 3. The board of directors shall meet at least once a year to approve the new fiscal year's budget. All board of directors meeting shall be open to all members, and meeting date and time shall be announced at a regular meeting.

Sections 4. The president or board of directors may call special meetings when necessary.
