These half pence tokens circulated in New England in the late 17th century. It is believed

they were coined in the period 1666 to 1690, with the dates 1672 and 1680 most commonly quoted. The real reason behind the production of this piece is unknown, but the reverse provides a clue in GOD PRESERVE LONDON that they were made after the



devastating London fire of 1666 and the plague of the same year. Being in Alabama, we can't help but say, "Roll Tide!"

Please bring a coin, medal, note, or something for Show-and-Tell. It's easy, fun, and adds interest to our meeting.


YN Notes



Around the tenth century, Italians began conducting their financial business outside on street benches. "Banca" is the Italian word for bench, which has since been altered slightly to give us the word "bank."

Answer to Last Month's Puzzle

For the penny or quarter puzzle the answer is "You will give me the quarter or neither of the coins." If Frank gave Ray neither coin, then the statement is true and Frank can't pick that option. If Frank gives Ray the penny, then Ray's statement is false, and Frank can't pick that option either. If Frank gives Ray the quarter, then the statement is true.

For the coin transaction puzzle, Frank had 1, 2, 4, 8, 16, 32, 64, 128, 256, and the remaining coins in the ten bags.

Ray's Coin Puzzle



Lay nine coins in the shape of an equilateral triangle, as shown above. The coins must touch each other. In the least possible number of moves, try to form the bottom figure.



You may only move one coin at a time (do not lift it up) and the coin which is moved must touch at least two other coins.

This puzzle can be solved in four moves. If you need help like Frank did, come find the solution at the next Madison County Coin Club meeting!
