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BRONZE MEDALLION REMINDER OF SHIP'S HISTORIC PAST

One of the exciting areas of collecting interest within the numismatic community is that of exonumia, or, as defined by Webster, "the study and collecting of tokens, medals, coupons, etc".

My main interest is in numismatics, but I do find that anything of unusual or historical importance grabs my attention. Although I do not really collect exonumia, I must admit to having a few pieces that are unusual and historically significant.

Over the years historic medals have been struck incorporating original pieces of metal from an historic object, and then sold as a souvenir or as a fund-raiser.

As a former Navy veteran, I am especially interested in historical Naval memorabilia. In going thru a box of "stuff" recently in a hidden part of my closet, I came across a unique and interesting bronze medal.

When the medallion was purchased for \$2, it included not only a nice souvenir of the ship, but also a lifetime admission to see the ship.

On the obverse was the name "U.S. Frigate Constellation" and the date 1797. On the reverse are the words "this coin struck from parts of the frigate Constellation the first ship of the U.S. Navy". Interesting!

After some careful research, I discovered the medals, which measure 1-1/4" in diameter, were struck in 1955 and sold for \$2 each as a souvenir and fund-raiser to help with the renovation of the ship.

The first frigate Constellation was first built in 1797 and served as a first line fighting ship with the U.S. Navy until 1853. It was then torn down and rebuilt as a corvette using the same name. A frigate is a fast ship with up to 60 guns and three masts. A corvette is a smaller ship with up to 38 guns on one level. The first Constellation was completed before the USS Constitution and is considered the Navy's first ship. The Constellation is now located in a maritime museum in Baltimore, Maryland.

The bronze medallion in my collection must have been given to me since I have not been to the ship in Baltimore. The copper used in the bronze casting came from actual copper spikes used in the original construction. When the medallion was purchased for \$2, it included not only a nice souvenir of the ship, but also a lifetime admission to see the ship.

If you like historical and unique items in your collecting interests, then consider exonumia. You might just find that item in your travels. ■

Jersey Copper 1/13th of a Shilling

These unusual denominations can be traced back to 1834 when Jersey decreed that English money would be the sole legal tender. At that time, 26 French *livres* were equal to one English pound. With 20 shillings to the pound and 20 *sous* to the *livre*, one shilling was worth 26 *sous*. Thus the Jersey penny or *pièce de deux sous* became 1/13th of a shilling, the Jersey half penny or *sou* 1/26th of a shilling, and the farthing or *pièce de deux liards* 1/52nd of a shilling.



Jersey is located off the coast of France in the English Channel.

One thing to note was that no one was obliged to receive in payment more than the value of one shilling in copper money.

During their twenty-five year life span, coins were issued only once for the one farthing and five times for both the half penny and penny.

These coins were ordered on July 13, 1840, sanctioned on September 11, 1840, and struck at the Royal Mint in 1841. The dies were engraved by William Wyon. The obverse has a dexter bust of Queen Victoria, with hair banded, as in the English coinage of that period, with the legend "VICTORIA: D: G: BRITANNIAR: REGINA F:D:" and the date. The legend in English is Victoria, by the Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland Queen, Defender of the Faith. The reverse has an ornamented shield of the arms of Jersey (gules and three gold colored lions passant gardent) with the legend "STATES OF JERSEY" around the upper half, while "1/52 OF A SHILLING", "1/26 OF A SHILLING", or "1/13 OF A SHILLING" around the lower half. The Jersey Government supplied this design to the Royal Mint. Then on November 12, 1841, the new coins arrived in Jersey aboard the steamship *Transit*.

During their twenty-five year life span, coins were issued for circulation only once for the one farthing and five times for both the half penny and penny. Also, proof only issues were struck in 1861 for the farthing and in 1865 for the penny. Due to the rise in copper prices, these heavy oversized copper coins were replaced in 1866 with smaller bronze coinage and then finally withdrawn from circulation in 1869 for recoinage.

The following table lists the year and the mintages for the large copper penny:

Due to the small number of coins, building a set of these unusual coins could present a rather interesting challenge for the average collector. Fortunately, these coins are relatively inexpensive and specimens range in price from \$5 for circulated examples to ~\$250 for uncirculated specimens. Proofs are also available and all are extremely rare.
