

Georgia Numismatic Association's 49th Coin and Currency Show

Over 1,800 people attended the Georgia Numismatic Association's (GNA) 49th Coin and Currency Show held in Dalton, GA April 19-21, 2013. Bourse Manager Chip Cutcliff stated that this year's show set a new record in public attendance and was a 22% increase over the 2012 show. Many people came to see the American Numismatic Association (ANA) Road Show exhibits, one of only five shows in the country to have the ANA bring the rare and valuable McDermott/Bebee 1913 Liberty Head "V" Nickel and the Idler/Bebee 1804 Dollar.

The GNA 49th Coin and Currency show opened to the public on Friday, April 19 with over 200 people waiting to enter the bourse floor. At the opening ceremony, Rod Gillis and Doug Mudd from the ANA cut the ribbon opening the show to the public.

Exhibit Manager Carl Lester said that this was the largest number of collector exhibit display cases ever at a GNA Show.

On Saturday, April 20, Pierre Fricke presented a program on "Collecting Confederate Paper Money". Dr. David Close presented a talk on "Beyond the Top 50: the Elite 30 Peace Dollars". Rod Gillis and Doug Mudd presented the program "Adding Value to the ANA". Later Rod Gillis presented a program titled "U.S. Chief Engraver Frank Gasparro: His Personal Archives and Sketches".
