Queen Victoria's Diamond Jubilee Medallions

In 1897 Queen Victoria passed a landmark that no reigning monarch had managed since or before the Norman invasion of 1066; she celebrated her 60th year on the throne and reached her diamond jubilee. As in 1887 with the celebrations for her Golden Jubilee, many artefacts commemorating this feat were duly issued.

Description

This medallion was issued in several versions by T Brock and was issued as 'The Diamond Jubilee of Queen Victoria, the official medal."

Obverse

The obverse features the veiled bust of the 'old head' Victoria with the inscription: -VICTORIA ANNVM REGNI SEXAGESIMVM FELICITER CLAVDIT XX IVN MDCCCXCVII

Reverse

The reverse depicts the famous young head portrait of Queen Victoria with the date of her accession to the throne (1837) below. To either side of the portrait is the inscription: -LONGITVDO DIERVM IN DEXTERA EIVS ET IN SINISTRA GLORIA

ANOTHER "1804 DOLLAR" FOUND.

August brings the story of the discovery of another "1804 Dollar." It is said that Mr. John Cunningham, of Leominster, Mass., while digging for fish-worms in the garden of his house on Pleasant street, "in one spadeful of earth which he turned over, struck something round and hard. Cunningham is a collector of old coins, and, thinking that he had struck some kind of coin, he examined and found it to be a piece of money, but it was so badly tarnished that he could not make it out. He took it into the house and put it into a solution of kerosene and alcohol and let it soak while he finished digging for fish-worms. He then gave the metal a thorough cleansing and scouring, and found that it was a silver dollar of 1804. The coin was not so badly damaged by the action of the earth, and after a liberal application of the solution and elbow-grease it was cleaned so that the figures and characters were as legible as they were the day the coin was minted."

Further particulars will be awaited with some interest, that the particular type and variety of this recent find may be learned, as there were no U. S. Dollars struck in 1804.

MCCC MEMBER ATTENDS GOLD MEDAL PRESENTATION

When the postal worker from Florida landed on the ground of the U.S. Capitol Building, I was in the 30 minute lockdown initiated by the Capitol Police. However, my main reason for being in the Capitol Building on Wednesday, April 15, was to attend the Ceremony for the presentation of the Congressional Gold Medal to the Doolittle Tokyo Raiders.

This Gold Medal is the highest honor Congress can bestow on any person or organization. The Doolittle Tokyo Raiders were recognized for their heroic flight 73 years earlier to bomb Japan. Their mission was a direct response by the United States to avenge the attack on Pearl Harbor by the Japanese. The damage inflicted on the Japanese was minimal, but it proved to the Japanese they were vulnerable to attack.

Six of the leaders of the U.S. House made their brief remarks to an audience of about 250 friends and supporters of the Raiders. The event was held in Emancipation Hall of the Capitol Visitors Center.

The last two surviving Raiders, out of 80 that flew the mission, were unable to attend due to another event at the Air Force Museum in Dayton, Ohio on April 18th. Lt.Col. Dick Cole, the copilot on Plane #1, and Staff Sgt. David Thatcher, the engineer-gunner on Plane #7 will present the Gold Medal to the Air Force Museum on April 18th to be placed on permanent display with other Raider artifacts.

Congressman Mo Brooks, R-Huntsville commented on the Doolittle Raiders, "The heroic actions of the Doolittle Raiders brought about a much needed victory for America and was a critical turning point in World War II".

The 3" pure gold Medal was on display during the ceremony. The U.S. Mint makes a 3" and a 1-1/2" bronze copy of the medal to be sold to the public after the gold Medal is presented.
