The Coin Collector's Companion (1795)

It has been asked why this universal rage of collecting Coins ?- In Anfwer to which it may be faid, There is no other way to preferve them from-Oblivion. Again, fome of them, on account of Device, fome for neatness of Workmanship, and all on account of their great Variety, may, nay will, claim the attention of the Curious in afterages. These confiderations incite the judicious to make Collections, efpecially of the best Impressons, while they are yet cheap and eafily to be met with, well knowing that they will never be of lefs value, nor their Beauty encreafed by Wear. Many Coins, which might have been had in Currency a few Months back, at the value of a Halfpenny, now on account of their fcarcenefs, bring a great Price; and others, which are now despifed for their Commonnels, will, in their turn, foon do the fame: Many Collections are already eftimated at great Value, and as time is daily adding thereto, what will they not amount. to in a few Years.

This Lift will therefore be a moft ufeful Companion and Affiftant in the Bufinefs of Collecting and Arranging the numerous Coins, and render that an agreeable Amufement, which has hitherto been very irkfome and confused. New Coins, as they appear, may by means of the blank Spaces, be added to the Lift, under their refpectve Heads, and thus for a long time to come, it will remain valuable, T.S.

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The Jersey Model Four Shillings

Initiated in 1999 there was an idea to produce an official series of six legal tender Millennial coins for a Commonwealth country, like the Solomon Islands or Zambia, which would feature the six monarchs of the twentieth century: Victoria, Edward VII, George V, Edward VIII, George VI and Elizabeth II. British sculptor Donald R. Golder completed the task of sculpting twenty Royal portraits, which were inspired by contemporary coinage models. The envisaged six-coin series never came to fruition, but two of Golder's royal portraits were eventually featured on the 2001 Zambia coinage set which commemorates the death of Victoria and the accession of Edward VII in 1901. A parallel series of modern high quality unofficial "retrospective patterns" for Great Britain, Australia, Canada, Cyprus, Hong Kong, Ireland, Isle of Man, Jersey, New Zealand, South Africa, and Southern Rhodesia have been produced using all of Golder's modern obverse portraits, coupled with modern reverses which are based on old designs. All the unofficial pieces have therefore been struck in the years 2000-2001. A.G. Wyon's original model for the reverse of the 1910 pattern crown, has been used to inspire some unofficial "pattern crowns" for George V and Edward VII. William Wyon's 'Three Graces' design, personifying Ireland, England and Scotland, has been the inspiration for a quantity of modern Victorian "patterns". There is a modern 'wreath crown' of Edward VIII featuring a new version of Kruger Gray's popular reverse motif and several modern "patterns" for Ireland, which emulate those of Reginald Huth. Altogether there are 174 unique modern gold strikings made with more than 50 (cancelled) original dies, lead impressions, etc. There are several thousand pieces in proof (.925) silver, copper and golden alloy (a metal akin to goloid used in the production of many US patterns) of the various types; all modern and struck in the year 2000.

These models were minted by the International Numismatic Agency. The International Numismatic Agency, commonly abbreviated as INA, is a British company based in London that produces and sells unofficial collectors' coins. Many of the INA's coins are currently listed in Krause's Standard Catalog of World Coins and Unusual World Coins.

MCCC Represented at 67th FUN Show In Orlando, FL

I attended the 67th Florida United Numismatists (FUN) Coin Show in Orlando, FL January 7 & 8, 2022. The FUN 2021 show was cancelled due to COVID-19, and the last show I attended was in 2019.

I attended the annual FUN member clubs' luncheon on Saturday, January 8 representing the Madison County Coin Club (MCCC). MCCC has been a member of FUN for about twenty years.

There was a good turnout of member clubs. FUN Vice-president Tony Swicer chaired the luncheon meeting and provided information to the club representatives. The FUN organization is doing very well, even with the FUN coin shows cancelled in 2020 and 2021 due to COVID-19.

The FUN January show will be held at the Orange County Convention Center- North Hall for the next five years (2023-2027). The North Hall is about a mile from International Drive in Orlando, and a long walk from most of the hotels in the area. Some of my observations from the FUN coin show are:

- Public attendance was down from prior years I attended. There were not the crowds that I experience at prior shows.
- When I entered the show on Thursday morning, I noticed dozens of empty tables. I asked a FUN representative and was told a number of West Coast and Northeast coin dealers cancelled. This was due he said to both the weather and COVID-19.
- The U.S. Mint cancelled. I was told that this was due to COVID-19.
- There was a lot of empty floor space in the convention hall compared to prior years. Most likely fewer tables were sold.
- Some dealers were doing great business. It seemed if you had bullion to sell, you were doing well. Tables close to the front of the convention hall had much better crowds than the tables all the way in the back (i.e., Budget Section) of the convention hall.
- I spoke with a couple of dealers in the Budget Section, and they both told me they were not having a good show and were not covering their trip expenses.
- YN programs were not held, including the Boy Scout program, as in prior years.

Overall, I enjoyed returning to the FUN Show. I saw a number of friends and attended three meetings. I found the bourse to be fun and enjoyed being on the

floor walking around. The exhibit area was excellent with a number of major, award winning exhibits on display to the public.
