## History

## ~ 1848-1873~

- 1848:
> CA Gold Rush Began Influencing Entire U.S. Market
- 1849:
> Price of Gold Dropped Relative to Silver's Value
- Gold Used to Buy U.S. Coins and Sell as Bullion on World Market
- Shortage of U.S. Coins in Circulation
- Mostly Spanish Colonial Reals Remained
- One Real: "Levy" (Value: ~12 Cents)
- Half Real: "Fip" (Value: ~6 Cents)

* 1850:
$>$ Daniel S. Dickinson (NY) Introduced Legislation for Three Cent Silver Coin
- Replace Colonial Spanish Silver Coins (Levy \& Fip)
- Provide Intermediate Denomination Between Cent \& Half Dime
- Did Not Pass
* 1851:
$>$ Congress Authorized Mintage of Three Cent Silver Coin
- Composition: 0.750 Silver \& 0.250 Copper
- Compliment U.S. Postage Stamp Price Reduction (5 Cents to 3 Cents)
- Legal Tender Limit Set to 30 Cents



## History

~ 1848-1873~

* 1851-1860:
> Highest Mintages Realized
> Two Additional Varieties Minted (Type II \& Type III)
* 1861-1863:
$>$ Gold \& Silver Coins Vanished From Circulation (Civil War \& Hoarding)
> Legal Tender Notes, Fractional Currency \& Postage Stamps Replaced Coins
> Mintages Reduced
* 1864-1866:
> Congress Began Minting Base-Metal Coins
- Restore Coins to Circulation
- 1864: Two-Cent Piece Introduced (Bronze)
- 1865: Three Cent Piece Introduced (Copper-Nickel Alloy)
- 1866: Shield Nickel Introduced (Copper-Nickel Alloy)
> Mintages Reduced Again
- 1867-1872:
> Mintages Reduced to a Few Thousand Per Year
* 1873:
$>$ Coinage Act of 1873 Discontinued Series
> Only Proof Coins Minted

## Three Cent Silver Coin Facts

* Designed by John B. Longacre (1794-1869)
$>4^{\text {th }}$ Chief Engraver at the United States Mint (1844-1869)
> Designed Flying Eagle Cent, Indian Head Penny, Shield Nickel, \& Double Eagle
* Official Name: "Trime"
* Minted in Philadelphia (1851-1873) \& New Orleans (1851)
* Sent Directly to U.S. Post Offices for Use with Stamps


John B. Longacre

* Type I Variety: 1851-1853
$>$ Weight: 0.8 Grams
> Composition: 0.750 Silver \& 0.250 Copper
$>$ Obverse: Union Shield on Heraldic Star Surrounded by Legal Inscription \& Date
$>$ Reverse: Roman Numeral III Embraced with an
Ornamental Letter "C" \& 13 Stars
> Mintages:
- 1851: 5,447,400
- 1851-0: 720,000


Example of Type I Variety
(Small Star)

- 1852: 18,663,500
- 1853: 11,400,000


## Three Cent Silver Coin Facts

Type II Variety: 1854 - 1858
> Weight: Reduced to 0.75 Grams
> Composition: Increased to 0.90 Silver

- Help eliminate Spanish Coins from Circulation
> Obverse: Two Additional Outlines Added to Star
- Identify Its New Weight
> Reverse: Olive Branch \& Arrows Added Above \& Below the Roman Numeral III
> Mintages:
- 1854: 671,000
- 1855: 139,000
- 1856: 1,458,000


Example of Type II Variety
(Large Star, 3 Lines)

- 1857: 1,042,000
- 1858: 1,603,700 (Proofs: 210)


## Three Cent Silver Coin Facts

Type III Variety: 1859-1873
> Obverse: Removal of One of the Three Outlines Around Star \& Smaller More Evenly Spaced Lettering

- Improved Strike Quality Over Variety I \& II
> Reverse: Unchanged
> Mintages:
- 1859: 364,200 (Proofs: 800)
- 1860: 286,000 (Proofs: 1000)
- 1861: 497,000 (Proofs: 1000)
- 1862: 343,000 (Proofs: 550)
- 1863: 21,000 (Proofs: 460)
- 1864: 12,000 (Proofs: 470)
- 1865: 8,000 (Proofs: 500)
- 1866: 22,000 (Proofs: 725)
- 1867: 4,000 (Proofs: 625)
- 1868: 3,500 (Proofs: 600)


Example of Type III Variety
(Large Star, 2 Lines)

- 1869: 4,500 (Proofs: 600)
- 1870: 3,000 (Proofs: 1000)
- 1871:3,400 (Proofs: 960)
- 1872: 1,000 (Proofs: 950)
- 1873: Proofs Only: 600


## Three Cent Silver Reception

Design Reviews: Mixed
> "One of the ugliest U.S. coins, though it has the redeeming feature of delicate workmanship" - Cornelius Vermeule (Art Historian)
$>$ "Something of a Sarah plain and small" - Dennis Tucker (Whitman Publishing)
$>$ "On so small a coin it is impossible that the device can be at once conspicuous and striking unless it is simple-complexity would defeat the object" - John B. Longacre (Designer)

* Public Consensus: Mixed
> Considered "Too Small" and "Easily Lost"
$>$ Nicknamed "Fish Scale" Coin
$>$ Complimented the Lowering of Postage to 3 Cents
$>$ Circulated Well While Other Silver Coins were Being Hoarded \& Melted


Historical Review: Positive
> "Played its part well in the U.S. monetary system, but there was no longer any need for it" - R. W. Julian (Numismatist)

## Three Cent Silver Legacy

> First U.S. Coin not to Depict Lady Liberty
> First U.S. Coin to Contain Metal Valued Significantly Less Than Its Face Value
> First Silver Coin not to be Legal Tender for an Unlimited Amount (30 Cents)

- Made Full Legal Tender with Coinage Act of 1965
> Collectability:

- Several Common Dates
- Popular for Type Collectors
- Three Different Varieties
- Popular for Variety Collectors
- Several Rare Dates
- Popular for Advanced Collectors
